#### **Meeting Agenda**

#### The objectives of the meeting are:

- (1) To discuss the draft 3<sup>rd</sup> Healthy Islands Monitoring Framework (HIMF) progress report, before it is finalized and tabled at the 14<sup>th</sup> Pacific Heads of Health meeting, and the use of HIMF data for national policy;
- (2) To exchange experiences and identify capacity building needs in health information system (HIS) and digital health (including eHealth) across the Pacific Island Countries and Territories (PICTs), and to discuss key implementation actions to operationalize the PHIN strategic plan; and
- (3) To develop coordinated, practical, and sustainable technical support in HIS and digital health that aligns with country needs and promotes data-driven policies.

#### The outputs of the meeting are:

- (1) Finalize the HIMF 3<sup>rd</sup> progress report ahead of the 14<sup>th</sup> Pacific Heads of Health meeting.
- (2) Identify solutions to HIS development needs in relation to the HIMF data collection process in PICTs.
- (3) Gain an understanding on:
  - a. digital health maturity assessment and utilize these findings to inform digital health planning in each country.
  - developments in data quality improvement initiatives specific to the use of the International Classification of Diseases (ICD) and civil registration and vital statistics (CRVS); and
  - c. opportunities for capacity building and resources available in the region.
- (4) Validate digital health maturity assessment country profiles for each country for publication.
- (5) Identify the highest priority capacity building and technical support needs related to digital health, ICD and CRVS, in alignment with initiatives from development partners; and
- (6) Network with development partners to share the current HIS and digital health challenges in PICTs and coordinate technical support provided based, on PICT priorities.
