Painful the sting is and how irritating the long-lasting itchy rash or welts

- a. Protects plant pests thereby devasting fruit trees, agroforestry, etc.
- Sting Agri-workers and so disrupt production and harvesting by agriworkers

Animals suffer high rates of skin irritations and tropical keratopathy, a clouding of the corneas resembling cataracts.


In natural ecosystems, they displace other ant species and predate on insects and vertebrates.

One Health Defined (OHHLEP 2021)

- One Health is an integrated, unifying approach that aims to sustainably balance and optimize the health of people, animals and ecosystems.
- It recognizes the health of humans, domestic and wild animals, plants, and the wider environment (including ecosystems) are closely linked and inter-dependent.
- The approach mobilizes
 multiple sectors, disciplines and
 communities at varying levels of
 society to work together to foster
 well-being and tackle threats to
 health and ecosystems, while
 addressing the collective need
 for clean water, energy and
 air, safe and nutritious food, taking
 action on climate change, and
 contributing to sustainable
 development.





Healthy Islands' is an ideal envisioned in 1995 at the first Pacific Health Ministers Meeting on Yanuca Island, Fiji.

In 2015, the vision was reaffirmed and a fifth and final line was added. Accordingly, the Healthy Islands vision is one where:

- Environments invite learning and leisure;
- People work and age with dignity;
- Ecological balance is a source of pride; and,
- The ocean which sustains us is protected.


